Title I, Part A - Improving Basic Programs Operated by LEAs Title I, Part A provides supplementary instruction by public school teachers or through a third-party contractor to students who are educationally disadvantaged and failing, or most at risk of failing, to meet high academic standards and who live in participating public school attendance areas. Please indicate the estimated number of Title I-eligible students: LEA funds for services to non-public/private school students and teachers are generated on the basis of the number of students from low-income families who reside in participating public school attendance areas and attend non-public/private schools. To be eligible for Title I services, a private school student must reside in a participating public school attendance area and meet multiple educationally related, objective criteria determined by the LEA and the private school officials during consultation. Poverty is not a criterion, but certain students may be identified as eligible solely by virtue of their status (e.g., students who are homeless or who in the preceding two years had participated in Head Start, a Title I preschool program, or a Title I, Part C (Migrant Education) program). Services may include a targeted assistance pull-out model, supplementary instruction, direct instruction, computer-assisted instruction, tutoring, counseling, family literacy, and early childhood programs.
